Any applicant making false statement in this application shall forfeit his permit and shall not be eligible to receive any permit for a period of ten years.

A privilege tax of \$100 is imposed on the business of selling, distributing, storing or manufacturing beer in this state effective January 1, 1994 and each successive January 1. Any holder of a beer permit issued after January 1, 1994 shall pay a pro rata portion of this annual tax when the permit is issued.

RESPONSIBLE ALCOHOL SERVICE

You should be aware of the local liquor laws regarding legal drinking age, acceptable ID's and serving minors. The legal drinking age is **21**. Any person attempting to purchase alcoholic beverages who appears to be under the age of 30 must produce an acceptable form of identification. If there is the slightest doubt about whether or not the guest is of legal age, ask to see an ID. Do not take the word of a regular guest or friend. Check for yourself. When carding someone, be pleasant and polite, but firm.

Proper ID's

There are only three forms of acceptable identification. If a guest appears to be under the age of 30 (thirty), you must by law check the identification of that guest. The following are the acceptable identification forms:

1. A valid, current driver's license of any state, which contains a date of birth and photograph of the person presenting the identification.
2. A valid, current special identification card issued by any state for the purpose of identification containing a date of birth and photograph of the person presenting the card (i.e. state ID)
3. A valid, current military or federal identification card issued by the federal government for the purpose of identification containing a date of birth and photograph of the person presenting the card (i.e. military or passport)

Each form of identification listed above must on its face establish the age of the person as 21 years of age or older. There must be no reason to doubt the authenticity or correctness of the identification. No form of identification mentioned above shall be accepted as proof of age if it is **EXPIRED, DEFACED, MUTILATED, OR ALTERED**. An educational institute identification card, check cashing card, birth certificate, or employee verification card is **NOT** considered lawful identification for the purchase of alcohol.

How Alcohol Affects the Body

The amount of alcohol absorbed into the bloodstream is BAC – Blood Alcohol Content

- The BAC limit in most states is .08.
- .08 is the equivalent to one drop of alcohol in 800 drops of blood.
- .30 could cause a coma and .40 could cause death
- Alcohol enters the body through the mouth going through the esophagus into the stomach area.
- The stomach releases alcohol into the bloodstream.
- Alcohol in the bloodstream occupies oxygen space causing light-headedness, slurred speech, and other symptoms of intoxication.
- Blood then travels to the liver where it is oxidized – or “cleaned” by the liver – and then released back into the bloodstream.
- If the stomach absorbs too much alcohol, a backup results.
- After the first hour of drinking, the liver can oxidize only one drink per hour.
- If alcohol backs up into the bloodstream, it will be distributed throughout the body, i.e. brain, heart, lungs.
- When alcohol is sent to the brain, the person shows signs of intoxication.

RESPONSIBLE ALCOHOL SERVICE

Myths to Sobriety

- Drinking coffee will sober the individual – Coffee merely stimulates the intoxicated individual. At best, an intoxicated person drinking a non-alcoholic beverage, such as coffee, will stop drinking alcohol and increase the amount of liquid in his or her body – allowing some time to pass before doing other activities, such as driving.
- Taking a cold shower – It will only make the person cold and wet.
- Exercising – It does not change the process of alcohol absorption. The Truth: ONLY TIME SOBERS

Risk Factors That Increase the Rate of Absorption

- Empty Stomach
- Low tolerance – not much of a drinker, does not normally drink
- Gulping instead of sipping
- Taking medication
- Frame of mind – happy go lucky drinker or depressed and needing a drink
- Male or Female – females normally absorb alcohol into the bloodstream factor because they are smaller and tend to have more body fat. Body fat does not absorb alcohol and as a result it is quickly released into the bloodstream
- Carbonated beverages – quickly pass into the stomach, enter the small intestine and quickly absorb into the blood stream

Factors That Decrease the Rate of Absorption

- Slow service
- Food in the system – High protein fatty foods slow absorption process
- Size of the individual – A large person will not absorb alcohol as quickly
- You may be able to buy time with non-alcoholic beverages – getting a guest to drink non-alcoholic drinks instead of alcoholic drinks

Alcohol's Effect on the Body

The human body is very sensitive to alcohol absorbed into the bloodstream. Only a small amount is needed for a person to experience a pleasant glow or relaxed inhibitions.

An inhibition is a mental or psychological process that restrains or suppresses a person's emotions, actions, or thoughts.

A guest's BAC can continue to rise even after he or she stops drinking and leaves your establishment. Although the guest appears fine when leaving, he or she can become intoxicated while driving home. For a guest's safety, do not serve doubles or drinks containing two or more liquors, such as Long Island Iced Teas, Martinis or Manhattans at last call.

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RESPONSIBLE ALCOHOL SERVICE

Food

Offering food with alcoholic beverages is important. Guests who are relaxing and enjoying food may not be drinking as much or as quickly.

In general, food slows the absorption of alcohol into the small intestine. This delay gives the liver more time to break down the alcohol in the person's bloodstream.

Food also helps protect the stomach from alcohol irritation. The foods that work best at slowing alcohol absorption are fatty, high-protein foods. The following are some foods that will help slow alcohol's absorption:

Chicken Wings

Chips

Chicken Tenders

Sugars and carbohydrates digest quickly and do not help slow the absorption of alcohol into the bloodstream – they actually can speed alcohol's absorption. Very salty foods stimulate thirst and can lead a guest to drink more alcohol.

Water

Water dilutes alcohol and relieves thirst. Water should be served with all alcohol beverages.

Rapid or Erratic Absorption

Some people are considered high-risk when consuming alcohol beverages:

- Someone under stress or depressed
- A temporary lining coats the stomach of a nervous person to protect it from excess acid. The person can consume alcohol and it is contained within the stomach. Eventually the temporary lining dissolves and the alcohol quickly moves into the small intestine and into the bloodstream causing the person's BAC to quickly rise.
- Someone dieting may not have eaten for a while and won't want to order food. Alcohol will move quickly into the bloodstream.
- Fatigue also causes alcohol to be quickly absorbed – affecting one's judgment

Tolerance

The ability to endure the effects of alcohol without exhibiting the usual symptoms is tolerance. An experienced drinker can consume a lot of alcohol without feeling or showing its effects. He or she usually has learned to hide the effects, even after becoming legally intoxicated.

Inexperienced drinkers can show signs of intoxication before they are legally intoxicated because their bodies are unaccustomed to alcohol and sensitive to smaller amounts. Always monitor your guests to avoid over-serving.

Medications

Over the counter and prescription medications can strongly influence the effects of alcohol. Certain drugs, such as cold tablets, allergy medications, tranquilizers, high blood pressure medications and antihistamines depress the body's central nervous system.

Alcohol can further interfere with the body's metabolism of some medications, causing the drugs to build up in the body instead of breaking down. These reactions magnify the impact of both the drug and the alcohol. For example, a combination of alcohol and barbiturates or tranquilizers can be fatal.

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Illegal Drugs

Illegal drugs are dangerous when mixed with alcohol. Do not serve a guest who appears to be under the influence of illegal drugs or allow the guest to drive away from the premises. Immediately contact your manager if you suspect illegal drug activity in your restaurant.

Behavioral Signs of Alcohol Absorption

Significant Behavioral Changes

A change in behavior is more significant than the actual behavior. There is a significant difference between a guest who is loud and boisterous upon arrival and a guest who is quiet upon arrival and then becomes loud and boisterous after a few drinks.

Relaxed Inhibitions

When alcohol first reaches the brain, a guest's normal inhibitions can become relaxed. A person may say or do things he or she normally would not. Signs of relaxed inhibitions:

- Becoming overly friendly to employees or guests
- Becoming detached, brooding, or quiet
- Suddenly leaving a group of friends and drinking alone
- Suddenly annoying other guests or using foul language
- Becoming loud and making rude comments about other people

Impaired Judgment

As a guest consumes more alcohol the brain's control of emotion and judgment is affected. The guest's ability to make sensible decisions can be hindered. He or she may not realize that in this condition it is unsafe to drive a vehicle.

Examples of impaired judgment:

- Becoming angry, tearful, or extremely emotional.
- Complaining about the strength of a drink after having consumed others of the same strength without complaining.
- Drinking faster or switching to larger or stronger drinks.
- Making irrational or argumentative statements.
- Becoming careless with money, such as buying drinks for strangers.

Slowed Reaction Time

After a person consumes a considerable amount of alcohol, his or her reaction time and responses become slower. The person may appear to be moving in slow motion and exhibit the following signs:

- Loss of concentration, memory and the ability to think clearly
- Drowsiness
- Inability to focus eyes and loss of eye contact
- Slurred speech

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RESPONSIBLE ALCOHOL SERVICE

Impaired Motor Coordination

After consuming a considerable amount of alcohol, motor skills are severely affected. Signs of ataxia, the inability to coordinate voluntary muscle movement, including loss of balance and coordination, are present.

Signs of ataxia:

- Staggering or stumbling
- Falling down or bumping into chairs
- Inability to pick up money off of a table
- Spilling drinks
- Dazing or swaying when seated

Remember: Observation and good customer service are keys to evaluating how alcohol is affecting a guest. Certain disabilities and physical conditions can cause a guest to stumble, slur his speech or have difficulty concentrating. An unobservant server may believe these are signs a guest is intoxicated.

3rd Party Liability

Employee Liability

Third – Party Liability states that an establishment and its employees may be held liable if an individual is served in the establishment to the point of intoxication and then causes injury to another person, death of another person or property damage.

Third party liability can apply to various injuries that an intoxicated individual causes.

- 1st Party – Injured person
- 2nd Party – Person committing crime
- 3rd Party – Jim 'N Nick's and Employees

If a drunk driver who was served alcohol at your establishment injures a person, then you and your establishment can be liable for damages sustained by the person even if you or your establishment did not directly cause the injury.

In some states, the laws governing third-party liability in alcohol-related cases are known as dram shop laws. The term originates from Old English laws in which taverns were referred to as dram shop.

Dram Shop Laws hold a liquor-serving establishment liable if they served beverage alcohol to a guest who leaves intoxicated and then injures another person.

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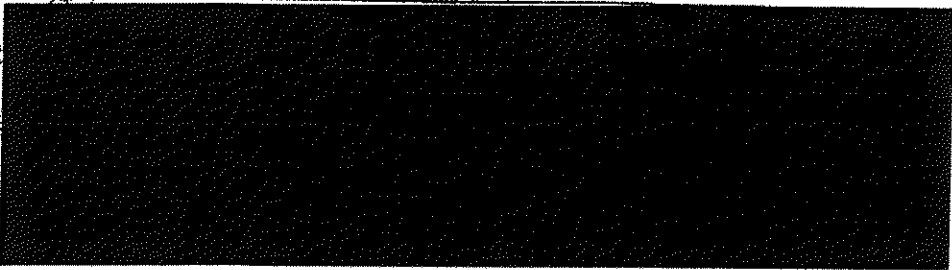
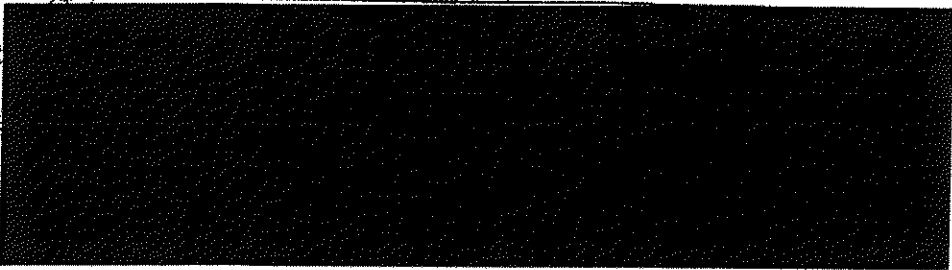
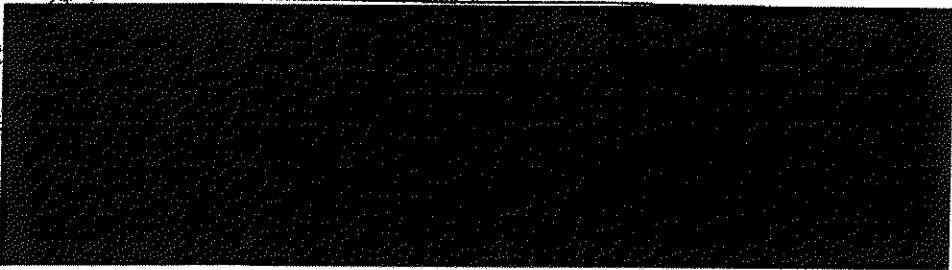
